Thursday 4th April 2013 Russell Foster

The Past, Present and Future of Sleep Russell Foster is Professor of Circadian Neuroscience, Chair of the Nuffield Laboratory of Ophthalmology, Director of the Sleep and Circadian Neuroscience Institute at the University of Oxford, Fellow of Brasenose College, Oxford, and is President elect of the British Neuroscience Association.

Caroline Evans

The Padded Bra: a Telegram from the Future?

Caroline Evans is Professor of Fashion History and Theory at Central Saint Martins College of Arts and Design (University of the Arts London) and a visiting professor at the Centre for Fashion Studies, Stockholm University. Her recently completed book The Mechanical Smile: Modernism and the First Fashion Shows in France and America, 1900-1929 is due from Yale University Press in May 2013.

Friday 5th April 2013 Tilli Tansey

The Rewarded and the Missing: Tales of Modern Neuroscientists

Tilli Tansey is a biomedical historian with two PhDs. She is currently the Honorary Archivist of the Physiological Society and deputy president of the History of Medicine Faculty at the Society of Apothecaries, and has served on the History of Medicine Funding Committee of the Wellcome Trust. She was elected a Fellow of the Academy of Medical Sciences in 2007, only the second medical historian to be so honoured.

He has extensive project experience across numerous sectors including housing, education, leisure, arts, transport and masterplanning. He previously worked on the delivery of the St Lucas Art Academy in the Netherlands and the Blue House in East London. Sean is the Louis I Kahn Visiting Professor of Architecture at Yale University.

Wednesday 10th April 2013 David Nutt

Was Freud Wrong to Give up on Drugs? The Future of Pharmacology in Relation to Mental Health

David Nutt is currently the Edmond J Safra Professor of Neuropsychopharmacology and Head of the Centre for Neuropsychopharmacology in the Division of Brain Sciences, Dept of Medicine, Hammersmith Hospital, Imperial College London. He broadcasts widely to the general public both on radio and television including BBC and Channel 4. In 2010 The Times Eureka science magazine voted him one of the 100 most important figures in British Science, and the only psychiatrist in the list.

Rosie Sykes

Food Arc

Rosie Sykes has cooked in the kitchens of some of the UK's most celebrated chefs. In 2001 she set up and ran a critically acclaimed gastropub - The Sutton Arms in Smithfield, London. Rosie is the former Kitchen Doctor for the Guardian's Weekend magazine and in 2008 she published The Kitchen Revolution (Ebury Press). Rosie is currently head chef at Fitzbillies in Cambridge and a regular columnist in the Guardian's new Saturday food supplement Cook.

Stephen McMahon is Sherrington Professor of Physiology at King's College London, and Director of the London Pain Consortium. He is a neuroscientist who trained with Patrick Wall in the 1980s. He has published more than 250 original research articles and is co-editor of the Textbook of Pain. He is the holder of a Wellcome Trust Senior Investigator Award and a Fellow of the Academy of Medical Sciences.

Jenny Sealey

Jenny Sealey has been Graeae's Artistic Director since 1997. In 2009, she was awarded an MBE in the Queen's Honours and became an Artistic Advisor for Unlimited 2012 Festival. Jenny co-directed the London 2012 Paralympic Opening Ceremony alongside Bradley Hemmings (GDIF).
